

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News from Guidance -Mrs. Eileen Calvert

Normal Conflict

As you know, there has been a great deal of focus on the issue of bullying in the schools following the enactment of New Jersey's Anti Bullying legislation. It is not uncommon as student awareness is raised, for there to be an upsurge in the identification of "bullying" situations. Becoming familiar with the definition of bullying is one step; our next goal is to help students learn to apply the definition to actual situations.

Everyone faces conflict in daily life and through it can learn how to negotiate and build relationship skills. This is particularly true for our students in grades four through six. As children transitioning into preadolescence, they are just beginning to develop their interpersonal skills. There are many situations which have the potential to escalate in minor conflicts and we work very hard to provide them with the tools they need to resolve their differences. This can often occur with simply bring the children involved in the situation for some conflict resolution. While there can occasionally be We are so very appreciative of the support of our parents consequences for their choices, our primary goal at this age is to help them learn better coping mechanisms that will help them throughout their life.

The power imbalance between the person bullying and the person being bullied is the best and quickest determinant of bullying versus conflict. Power can come in many forms: size, age, strength, number; social status; economic resources, ability, or sense of self. Children who bully usually find pleasure in their behaviors and the reaction of others. The perception of power imbalance is identified by the child who is bullied.

Students who are confronted about their bullying behaviors often fall back on excuses such as "I was just teasing" or "They just can't take a joke!". It is important to understand that there is a great difference between joking, teasing and bullying.

Joking: Intention is to create humor and fun; usually between friends; reciprocal

Teasing: Intention is to provoke a reaction such as anger, embarrassment or confusion

Below is a chart which illustrates some other key differences between bullying and conflict

Occasional

- Not pre-planned, in the heat of the moment
- Genuine upset to both parties
- Trying to work things out
- Not trying to take something from someone
- Both parties admit some responsibility
- Effort to solve problem by both parties

Bullying Behavior

- Can happen repeatedly
- Premeditated, on purpose, intentional, planned
- Person being bullied is more upset
- Trying to be the one in control
- Want to take power or possessions from someone
- Blame is laid on the person who is bullied
- No effort to solve the problem by the person bullying
